Analyze, Adjust, Improve:



The 2024 racing season is here. Masts are being raised and boats are being launched. The first race of the season is on Sunday May 5, followed by two races on Saturday May 18 and the Spring regatta on Saturday May 25. The Mark Shockey memorial race with be on Sunday June 9.

The racing rules and schedule for race chairmen and the committee boat are published on the RFSC website 2024 racing folder. There are still a few open dates for the committee boat towards the end of the season. The committee boat is anchored at the start-finish line. They start the race and record the elapsed times as the boats cross the finish line. Contact one of the race committee members to sign up for the remaining open dates.

The skippers meeting prior to the races will be at 12:30 am on the steps to the upper parking lot. Sailors new to racing are always welcome to crew with experienced racers or ride along on the committee boat and watch the race from the start-finish line.

The Spring Regatta will be a fun race held on Saturday, May 25. Pairs of boats will be racing to cross the finish line together. The closer in time the pairs of boats finish, the better their score. Commemorative Spring regatta flags will be issued.
