Sailing the Florida Keys (Part 1) by Howard & Kathy Staley

Ahoy..... Admiral (or Sweetie or Honey, etc.), how about us sailing the Florida Keys?

Away from the blinding snow, the biting wind, and chilling cold. Away from our wood stove's cozy fire, from the beautiful white snow, from watching the birds huddled on the window feeders. Away from

traffic jams, from cars skidding on icy pavement, from snow shovels, rock salt, cinders and sand.

Away from snuggling under down-comforters piled high on the bed, from walks through new fallen snow, and, oh oh,.... away from enjoying the first hint of spring..... should it arrive before we return.

What a decision to have to make!! Well, we made that decision,..... and it was to sail the Keys during the month of March, 2010.

Here's how our trip went.

The Overall Trip

We left home in late February and returned in early April. The southbound road trip commenced with towing our 24 foot Neptune sailboat, Aeolus, from Cincinnati, to the upper Keys. We launched just south of Florida City.

We then sailed the Intercoastal Waterway (ICW) about 85 miles down the Keys, on the Florida Bay side (North side), to Ohio Key. Ohio Key is about fifteen miles west of Marathon, next to Bahia Honda State Park. Ohio Key was the end of the underway sailing trip. We visited seven ports, spent about six nights at anchor, sailed six days and spent seven weather days in port or at anchor.

At the end of our sailing trip, while the boat was dockside at Ohio Key's Sunshine Marina, we traveled by bus back to Florida City to pick up our van & trailer. We also made several driving day-trips just exploring the Keys, which included visiting Key West. After that it was time to load Aeolus onto the trailer and drive home.

Sailing the Keys was a great, destination oriented sailing trip, the kind we especially like. We saw new ports, traveled new routes, experienced new anchorages and met many people.

We plan to duplicate and expand the journey in 2011, doing more sailing, seeing some of the same ports and also new harbors, communities and anchorages.

Preparation

Preparing for the cruise started activity on several items concurrently. These items included: Charts, Boat Preparation, Equipment Gathering, and Provisioning.

Charts and Cruising Guides

Richardson's Chartbook & Cruising Guide of the Florida Keys covers the sailing area from Ft. Lauderdale to Key West, the Dry Tortugas & Bimini. We also used the NOAA chart number 11451 covering from Miami to Marathon and Florida Bay. We rely on paper charting exclusively since we carry no electronic chart plotting equipment. Our 12 year old Garmin GPS tells us only where we are. Sailing the Keys is almost always within sight of land.

Cruising Guides are invaluable for "reading up" on the next port or anchorage. We used Claiborne Young's Cruising The Florida Keys and Freya Rauscher's Florida Keys and Everglades Cruising Guide.

All charts and cruising guides should be studied and annotated long before your trip, both for trip planning purposes, and for the sheer enjoyment of it. The hours consumed in this endeavor, both in front of a fireplace or in a cozy bed, caused the dank cold darkness of a northern winter to be absolutely enjoyable.

Of course, all our charting tools had to be assembled and put in a convenient easy to use case. Tools such as dividers, parallel rulers, soft lead pencils, sharpeners, a good soft eraser, etc., make navigation much easier.

Equipment Gathering

Equipment gathering is actually kind 'a fun. We gather things for the trip and put them in boxes (usually liquor boxes from Kroger). Each category of items has its own "gathering box". For example, the SAFETY & OPTICAL BOX includes PFD's, flares, distress flag, whistles, Binoculars, etc.

The ELECTRONICS & NAVIGATION BOX has VHF Radios, GPS, Hand Held Compass, Batteries, AC and DC chargers, AM/FM Short Wave Radio, Navigation Tools, Charts, Cruising Guides, Flashlights, etc. There is a Galley Box (for galley equipment), a VeeBerth Box for stuff that goes up there. A Books / Entertainment Box for leisure reading, boat technical manuals, games, camera, CD's, etc., and so on.

Over the month(s) before our trip we simply fill the boxes (that are situated on a spare bedroom's floor). You can easily see what items you have collected, and spot those that are missing.

The filled boxes are transported in the van, rather than the boat, to shift weight off the boat and onto the van, when towing. They are loaded onto the boat at launch time.

Provisioning

Kathy organizes the shipboard meal menu for the whole trip utilizing an Excel spreadsheet. For meals, the sheet tallies the ingredients required, and also tallies our needs for the whole trip. For special meals, like spaghetti, we home-make the sauce and can it in Mason jars. This makes good homemade meals available by simply warming them up on the boat. Pasta meals made with canned tuna, chicken and salmon are also favorites. Even though we have a 5 day cooler, we provision as if we have no refrigeration.

When getting ready for the trip, provisions are placed in their various "gathering boxes" as mentioned on the previous page.

Of course, canned goods are a staple. For "fresh foods", we also stock up on cabbage, carrots, potatoes and onions. They last long if kept in a dark airy place on the boat. Also, contrary to popular opinion, eggs, butter and mayonnaise do not require refrigeration.

Crewing and Sailing Trips by Jon Hill

There are great opportunities for vacations doing that thing we all love, SAILING! Facebook allowed Shiri and I to meet great captains around the country.

We sailed the Columbia River with SeaHawks Steve and the San Juan Islands with SvenDaViking. We explored the Bahamas with Captain Frank and Rafa. In the Bahamas we sailed and sailed with Captain Jim (Shiri got amazingly good at reading the wind on that trip). Many were good people I found in various Facebook groups. Just the same as in our club, many love to sail and just needed crew to help them.

I have 3 sailing trips planned the same way this year. On June 10th I will be flying to West Palm Beach where I will meet Captain Jamie and another crew member. We will then sail to Newport Rhode Island with a little bit of adventure on the way.

Here are a few tips for crewing.

- 1. There are various crewing websites that charge money. Those can be good because they filter out many of those damn dirty hippies that are just looking for a free boat to stay on. There are also Facebook groups that do a great job of connecting people for free. Some of the groups are private so if you would like an invite, send me an email.
- 2. People are inviting you into your home/boat. When posting or commenting on FB groups, its important to have a clear photo of your face that is less than a year old as your profile photo. Doing that helps foster trust.
- 3. When you comment or contact someone about crewing, be brief because the captain will likely have a lot of messages to get through. Mention your experience and offer references (friends from the clubs, other sails you have done and so on). Try to keep it to 4-5 sentences.
- 4. Include your phone number. Many captains don't have reliable internet so checking Facebook or other websites can be hard for them to do regularly. Including a phone number or Whatsapp number will make things a lot easier for everyone to connect.

- 5. When you do speak with the Captain, ask what they need help with or what role in the crew would be most beneficial for you to fill.
- 6. Some Captains want someone that will wait until ordered. Others want someone that will jump in and do what is needed. Ask your Captain which they prefer.

Next month I will share about the satellite communicator I use. It allows me to text and post my routes plus it has SOS features. You can see Shiri and I's Virgin Islands trip on my Garmin page. You can also follow my Atlantic trip from there.
